#### Nigel Forteath - My Upside-Down Red Tag (continued)

I do have a fly to share with you which I developed while fishing Arthurs Lake. I call it my Upside-down Red Tag. I modified the Red Tag because I had trouble seeing the standard version. This fly sits up much better. The size also matches the duns we have here. It is primitive, but it works. The Upside-down Red Tag is meant to be somewhere between an Emerger and a Non Emerger and I have fun fishing it. I have also included a few flies I frequently fished very successfully when

# NT Adventure May/June 2023 by Terry Horan

For the second year running we headed to the Northern Territory to visit our daughter Frances, son Patrick and his partner Sarah.

We again missed the famed runoff at the end of the wet season. Patrick informed us that the big wet season created the best runoff and sight barramundi fishing for 25 years on one particular river system according to local fishers. Patrick and Sarah were on hand to experience barramundi fishing of a lifetime.

Patrick and Sarah mostly targeted the Victoria River and found the best fishing from the shore on the rock bars at daylight. The Barra were chasing mullet in shallow water and sight fishing was spectacular. The Billabongs were also fantastic in April for sight fishing Barra from the boat according to Patrick.

In the photo below: Note the head torch around Patrick's neck where pre-dawn starts provided the best fishing. The headlamp also showed up crocodile eyes to let you know to stay on your toes.



We arrived in late May and the river and lagoon sight fishing peak had passed.

Patrick and Sarah picked us up from Darwin airport and we headed to Corroboree Billabong, boat in tow. I caught my first barramundi on fly and caught Saratoga, Tarpon and Long tom on fly. Patrick has become obsessed targeting Saratoga on fly. We spent a big part of the day hard up against the Lilly pads casting flies as far back into the bank as we could. I can see why it could become an addictive form of fly fishing. The fish just smash the fly when it's pulled over the Lilly pad and the fly lands in a gap. If the fish misses the fly in the first gap, they will chase the fly as you strip it over the pads and hit it at the next gap of open water between the lily pads.





We had a couple of great days with Patrick and Sarah and then Fiona and I flew out to Nhulunbuy on the tip of the Gulf, to visit our daughter Frances for a couple of weeks. Patrick and Sarah drove out to join us in their Mitsubishi Pajero.

Our immediate past president Peter Berne knows all about the road trip on the Central Arnhem Highway to Nhulunbuy, as Peters son Mathew, lives and works at Nhulunbuy and Peter has traversed the Australian continent to visit Mathew.

We stayed with Frances for two weeks and did some amazing camping trips with Fran in her trusty Toyota Prado. Cape Arnhem would be one of the most remote and beautiful places I have visited. Getting there involved some serious 4WD rough terrain, sand dune and beach running. To make the journey to the Cape a little more nerve wracking, Fran had some good friends from Darwin attempt the trip into Cape Arnhem a few weeks prior to us and they got stuck in the sand on the beach and lost their brand-new Toyota Hilux when the tide came in and swamped the vehicle.

Needless to say, Frances and Patrick were a little nervous on the trip in.

The tides are pretty big up North so careful consideration was given on our inwards and outwards beach run timing to coincide with low tide. All went well and Frances, Patrick and Sarah proved very capable sand and beach drivers.

The fishing at Cape Arnhem was exciting. We caught a lot of species from the rocks. Fly fishing proved very difficult due to big swells, sharp rocks, coral, sharks and holding onto fish once hooked. The reef sharks were ferocious. A good fish on fly takes a lot of time to land and with the number of sharks in the water, time is something you didn't have. All the while you had to also consider saltwater crocodiles.

Saying that we ate fish most meals while camped at Cape Arnhem, mostly thanks to Patrick. Species caught included Rock Cod, Spanish Flag, Barracuda, Mangrove Jack, Spanish Mackerel, Queenfish. I hooked but did not land a Giant Trevally on fly. A 8wt rod was a bit underdone for this environment and it was all over pretty quickly.

Our next camping expedition was to Macassans. This area is named after the Macassan fisherman from Makassar, Sulwasi, an Island of Indonesia. Hundreds of fisherman made the annual sea voyage on the trade winds to the top end of Australia for many hundreds of years before British colonization. The Macassans had permission from and strong connections with the local Indigenous clans of the Yolngu people of North East Arnhem Land. Over hundreds of years the Indonesian and Yolngu aboriginal people worked and traded together. The Yolngu people allowed and assisted the Macassans to harvest and process (Trepang) Sea Cucumber or as we call them Sea Slugs. In return for the harvest and local labour the Macassans traded tea, tobacco, smoking pipes, steel axes, knives, hooks, calico, alcohol, Tamarind and other items. The Macassans traded the processed Trepang with the Chinese. Over the centuries the Yolngu even travelled back to Indonesia with the sea traders. The Yolngu language has over five hundred Macassan words in it. Some Yolngu people have Macassan heritage.









 While at Macassans the fishing was not great, due to strong winds and poor access, with high rock cliffs and ledges, but they did protect you from crocodiles when camping on the coastal fringe. The surf was very rough and we decided that day walks, sightseeing and heritage visits were a good option on this trip.

Our next adventure was a fishing trip organised by our daughter Frances on Melville Harbour with a work contact. His family also run Mother ship fly fishing adventures around East Arnhem. Not long after we were there they were hosting a Mother ship trip for a group of American fly fishermen.

This was to be the ladies fishing trip with the aim of filling Fran's freezer (only a fridge top freezer) in the mornings outing. The ladies are not really into fly fishing so at sunrise they caught live bait (sardines) and after putting enough in the live bait tank they were into it.

Over the next several hours they caught some magnificent fish. Long tail tuna, Mackerel tuna, Giant trevally, Queenfish, Spanish Mackerel, Coral trout, Rock cod, Nanagai and Snapper. The harbour seemed to be teaming with fish. A lot of fish were released and a few prime species especially kept for Nhulunbuy elders that Fran knows.







Nhulunbuy is a beautiful place to visit. The beach fishing on the town beach and East Woody Island was terrific. Patrick rated the fly fishing from Woody Island and beach highly.

I can't wait for our next trip to the Northern Territory in 2024.
