The Red Tag

Background:

The red tag most likely started life in Worcestershire in the 1850s tied by Martin Flynn. It was tied as a dry or wet fly for grayling and originally known as the *Worcestershire Gem* or *Worcestershire Wonder*. The red tag was originally used as a wet fly before its potential as a dry fly was realised. It seems to have arrived in Australia in the early 1900s and soon caught on, particularly in Tasmania.

The following excerpt from the Goulburn Valley Fly Fishing Centre website sums it up nicely: The Red Tag is an Australian Icon. It is a fly that everybody who has fished for trout has some time, or another used and more than likely with some degree of success. It is revered on the lakes up top in Tasmania as being probably the single best pattern available. Used in just about every situation it has caught fish consistently; those feeding heavily on duns, at first light in midge hatches, rainbows in wind lanes sipping terrestrials, in shallow lakeside margins when fishing to tailers, moochers and foragers, in 150 feet of water and 3 feet waves and while wade polarising small lagoons in the Western lakes. There is very little more need be said about its effectiveness and status down south.

The Tie:

Hook Dry fly 18-8, most commonly 16-10.

Thread 6/0 black or brown.

Body Peacock herl.

Hackle Brown/ginger cock hackle.

Tag Red Wool.

Process:

- 1. Set the hook in the vice.
- 2. Lay from the hook eye the bend the thread.
- 3. Tie in a bunch of red wool.
- 4. Depending on hook size tie on 2-, 3-, or 4 peacock herls.
- 5. Wind forward to form the body about 2 thirds of the hook shank.
- 6. Tie off and trim the butts.
- 7. Tie in the hackle and wind forward towards the eye.
- 8. Tie off the hackle and build a small head.
- 9. Trim the hackle waste and apply head cement.



Note:

- Wool soaks up water, so options are to use red dyed feather fibres or red float-Vis or similar.
- 2. Select a hackle with fibres equal to the hook gape.
- 3. Tie in the hackle with the curved side facing forward.
- 4. As an effective wet fly use a heavier gauge hook and a hen hackle.
- 5. The variations to this tie can be found in "Australia's Best Trout Vlies Revisited" 2006, Malcolm Cross and "The New Illustrated Dictionary of Trout Flies" 1986, John Roberts.

The Willow Grub

Background:

Willow grubs are tiny terrestrials that pupate within the small galls, or blisters found on willow leaves. The first warm days of December usually signals their emergence, and this continues through to late summer.

They are the larvae of the willow gall sawfly (*Pontania proxima*) and originated from Europe and Western Asia.

As willows line many of our lowland streams, many of these grubs find themselves upon the water, struggling within the meniscus. To be eaten voraciously by the trout and the trout love them. The trout will position themselves in a feed lane downstream to hungrily sip each grub that falls.

The grubs can be either pale green or yellow. A simple yellow tie is described below.





The Tie:

Hook Grub Hook #14 - 12.

Body Yellow or pale green tying thread or silk.

Head Body thread coloured with black marker.

Rib Fine monofilament (optional).

Process:

1. Set the hook in the vice.

- 2. Build the body in layers of thread fatter towards the hook eye.
- 3. Create the head with the black marker.

4. Whip finish.



Note:

- 1. The falling natural tends to float for a while before sinking, so the imitation can be fished on the surface or below.
- 2. Accurately cast your fly many times a foot or two upstream of the trout. Any further away and it will not be seen and ignored by the trout. Patience and persistent casting is required to fool these trout as they are totally locked in on these insects.

Guest Speaker:

The President reintroduced Greg French to the members. Greg's topic was on his 5 favourite waters in the deep western lakes. There were no surprises on the ones that he selected, and each were accompanied with some excellent photos.

Lake Nameless: This has the best mayfly hatch, and the duns prefer overcast days. It can be used as a base camp to visit other waters.

Lake Ina: Unlike other waters the nymphs crawl out of the water to hatch. Some nymphs are picked up by snakes. There are many large boulders in the lakes that the nymphs crawl up and the fish can be seen picking them off. The fish are active from first light and continue through the day – even in bright sunlight.

Lake Meston/Junction Lake: This has big rocky shores and the best way to fish it is from a boat. Rainbows will cruise the edges for the full length of the lake and are mostly beetle feeders. The colours of the rainbow trout are different to those found elsewhere.

Lake Antimony: This water is ideal for wade polaroiding as the silty base allows the fish to be seen more easily. It is on the Pine River system and other lakes are nearby.

Lake Malbena: This is a deep lake, and the fish tend to stay deep among the weed beds. It is best fished from a boat as the lake edges are tree-lined. This water is now owned by 'Drake Enterprises' and anglers cannot access this anymore.

Following a brief set of questions the President led the members in showing their appreciation to Greg for his most informative presentation.

CLUB FINANCES:

Special Resolution


