My favorite water Little Pine Lagoon has been a disaster with very few fish caught, not many insect hatches and the water at times very turbid. The only good thing was the few fish that were caught



were in good condition. We can only hope that fishing improves in the next few seasons.

Some recent works at Koongara have seen the solar panels raised, this should prevent any leaf litter from building up underneath them. The legs were fabricated by Graeme Frankcombe and installed on the roof by Graeme and me. (photos on page 12)

The Pheasant Tail Nymph

Background:

The Pheasant Tail Nymph's (PTN) history, also known as Sawyer's Pheasant Tail, is rooted in the picturesque chalk streams of Hampshire Avon, where riverkeeper Frank Sawyer first conceived and tied this pattern in 1958.

Sawyer was a passionate angler whose deep understanding of the river's aquatic life inspired this creation. A true pioneer of nymph fishing and close friend of **G. E. M. Skues**, he crafted the Pheasant Tail Nymph using wire and short-legged pheasant tail fibres to mimic the appearance of a typical mayfly nymph suspended in flow. The PTN was inspired by a fly known as the Pheasant Tail Red Spinner which caught more fish when it was submerged. Sawyer observed that typical mayfly nymphs floated in the stream with their legs held close to their body. He had also noted that the nymphs had a coppery sheen, so he let plenty of the copper wire show through when dressing the fly.

Sawyer's contribution to fly fishing extended beyond introducing a new pattern. His 1958 book "Nymphs and the Trout" offered detailed guidance on tying and fishing the Pheasant Tail Nymph and remains a recommended classic for those eager to master nymph fishing.

Since its creation on the tranquil waters of Hampshire Avon, the Pheasant Tail Nymph has gained popularity on trout streams worldwide. Over 60 years later, its influence remains strong, a testament to Frank Sawyer's genius and the enduring charm of fly fishing.

Simplicity is the keynote and Sawyer used only two materials, fine copper wire and fibres from a cock pheasant centre tail feather – no tying thread.

Over the years modern fly tyers have modified the design in various ways, the most popular variation being the addition of a peacock herl thorax, but in the opinion of many fly fishers nothing can beat the original for simplicity and effectiveness of the original Frank Sawyer tie.

I have included a popular present-day version of the PTN.

The Tie:

Hook Nymph #10 - 16.

Thread Brown.

Tail Cock Pheasant Tail feather fibres.

Body Cock Pheasant Tail feather fibres.

Wing Case Cock Pheasant Tail feather fibres.

Rib Fine Copper Wire.

Thorax Peacock Herl.



Process:

- 1. Set the hook in the vice.
- 2. Wind the thread to the hook bend and tie in the copper wire.
- 3. Select 5 or 6 Pheasant Tail fibres and tie in with the tips forming the tail.
- Make a rope of the tail fibres and wind forward to about halfway along the hook shank.
- 5. Tie them down on the top of the hook, but do not trim them.
- 6. Wind the copper wire forward and tie off at the same point.
- 7. Tie in a couple of strands of peacock herl and wind forward to just behind the hook eye. Tie off and trim excess.
- 8. Form the wing case by bringing the peacock fibres (process 5) forward over the peacock herl. Tie off.
- 9. Any remaining strands of fibres can be swept back to form the legs.
- 10. Hold in position to tie down and form the head.
- 11. Whip finish.

Note:

- 1. The length of tail to be slightly less than half the hook length.
- 2. The copper wire is wound in the opposite direction to the fibres.

Fishing the PTN:

In streams and rivers, the Pheasant Tail can be presented by casting upstream and allow the current to present the fly in a natural manner below the surface. Alternatively, cast across the stream and allow the fly to sink on a dead drift and then gently raised in the water as it approaches the feeding trout to imitate the behaviour of the natural insect. Watch the tip of the fly line for any movement and, if seen, lift the rod tip and gently set the hook.

On lakes, use a floating line with greased sunken leader, retrieve the fly very slowly just below the surface. Pay particular attention to shallow areas near weed beds

Lake Pedder was created in 1972 by the flooding of the original Lake Pedder for Hydro development. The first IFS stocking was in 1973, and fishing became popular from 1974 onwards with the average size of trout in 1978 approaching 5 kg. Since the early 80's the average size trout has dropped to around 1 kg. The original lake was about 10 sq km with the surrounds being marshy.

It was Bruce's brother that first noticed the fish movement in Pedder. This attracted the family and friends to fish the Lake. They always fished the southern section area near Scotts Peak Dam a place called 'Home Shore' where the camping was excellent. On one night they caught 3 fish weighing 10.5lb, 12lb and 13.5lb the largest that they have landed is 18.5lb.

The President led the members in showing their appreciation to Bruce for his excellent presentation.


