President's Report

Hello members.

The next general meeting on the 4th of June will be the Club's last meeting at Chant St due to the sale of the building. The St Michaels Association has offered us the use of a hall at their complex in Hobblers Bride Road Newstead on the same terms as we have for Chant St.



Committee members have met and viewed the hall and believe it

will be a suitable venue for our Club meetings. We will have access to a locked cupboard for the library and will be able to have the filing cabinet stored in a rear corner of the hall. We may not be able to have the bigger wooden cabinets. The honor boards can be hung but may have to be removed after each meeting as the hall is used for basketball and cricket. These are minor issues which can be worked through. There are toilets and a kitchen where we would have a cupboard to store the mugs and other items. There is also ample parking in an area which is well lit.

As mentioned in my last report, several committee members have been trying to get a better option for the Club's building insurance. Once it is mentioned that there are multiple users of the shacks it is then classed as a short-term rental and insurers will not offer cover. The committee has decided to increase the excess to \$5,000; this will save the club over \$900 on the insurance premium. We have also received a refund of \$370 from our last premium payment because we have activated the change now.

It is very disheartening to see the very low water levels in some of the highland lakes, especially Little Pine Lagoon, currently minus 1.43 meters and falling. This is the second year in a row of very low levels. Let's hope we get some good rain in the near future.

Noonamena has now been winterized, any member using the shack must follow the instructions listed. This is extremely important to prevent any damage through water freezing in the system.

Christmas in Winter will be held on Saturday the 5th of July at Noonamena, any member wanting to attend this event must reply by the next meeting. The cost is \$20 plus \$10 per night if staying at the shack.

For any member wanting a night or two away the shacks are half price for the off season.

A few thoughts about casting practice—by Charles Peck

I attended the last casting practice at Grindelwald having been otherwise engaged for some time - a bit of fishing included. It was soon obvious that I needed to smarten up after a couple of missed targets in near perfect conditions - the whole object of casting at targets! Also obvious was the significant improvement of some casters in the past year and the problems of others due to simple casting or equipment faults.

When I first started fly fishing (as a school kid) a family friend informed me that once I could accurately place the fly on a dinner plate at 15 yards about 5 times in a row he would take me to the Shannon Rise to fish. He fished there each year as did several of my school friends with their fathers, so I had heard a lot about the Shannon Rise.

My father did not fly fish and my grandfather Peck (a farmer) told me he did not need a rod although he once had a fishing licence. The St Leonards policeman told him he was giving a lot of trout around to friends and he should have a licence. (I suspect a fine might also have been involved). My grandfather explained how to tickle trout which was how he fished the North Esk.

I had received a proper fly rod (a 3piece Turville "Mitta") for my 15th birthday and I bought a J.W.Young reel and No3 Dodge line from my savings from selling rabbit skins. I persisted with casting practice and after a couple of months let the family friend know I could do it. Unfortunately he deferred at the time and then died soon after.

I waited about three years before I got to the "Shannon Rise" - by then I was working and self funded the week at the old Miena Hotel, a Cook's bus trip from Launceston via Deloraine and

Breona. (The Poatina road did not exist then.)

A great week of fishing, none landed from the river - numerous breakages in fast water with gut casts but plenty landed from dawns and evenings on the Shannon Lagoon. Also a day at Penstock Lagoon where I was taken too by another guest. I met a number of the best of Australian fly fishers and competition fly casters during that week at the Shannon.

The Hotel was fully booked, it was quite a social occasion for them - Mr and Mrs Gillies (J.M.Gillies & Co, Melbourne), the Southams (also rod-makers) from Sydney, John D. Brooks (noted angler and author) and Vic Yann (tackle maker) from Victoria and many others from Tasmania—including the Wigrams and their friends.

Then Compulsory National Service call - up and CMF training which deferred much fishing for a couple of years during which the HEC stopped the Shannon River.

I learnt a few things from early back yard practice and later competitive casting such as -

- Don't tip the water with the false cast, it frightens the fish and can also interfere with the line trajectory.
- Ensure that your forward false cast straightens out clear of the water before the rod reverses direction to throw the line backwards.

(Strict casting competition rules require penalty demerits for tipping or "no cast".) (Some of the scores last Sunday would have been negative if all the rules were followed.)

• Minimise false casts - the fewer the better and don't take the rod back too far - just a neat sharp stop, or pause after changing direction on the back cast.

 Learn to change direction while the line is lifting off on the back cast so that the moment the rod is stopped for the forward delivery, it is positioned to deliver directly to the intended target.

(This simple practice is very valuable when fly fishing to rapidly moving fish. If you try to change direction on the delivery cast you will usually put a bend in the line (and cast) when it lands on the water. Hence you lose accuracy.)

Where a long length of line is already on the water, a short roll cast (into the air, clear
of the water) to lift the line before the back cast, is a real help. It reduces the load on
the rod.

Above all when fishing, remember that no self respecting trout will hang about waiting to be caught when the angler tips the water during his cast. Also minimize your casting it is the first delivery that matters, not the seventh or eighth try.

As for equipment when fishing dry fly I prefer to fish with a line that is rated at least one size higher than my preferred 'stiffish' rods because where I fish is usually windy. I have to fish from a boat and need to cover fish quickly. With an "overweight" line I have line control as the rod loads up immediately. (it takes longer to load the rod with a lighter line) This ensures minimum false casts or none at all.

If fishing wet fly, particularly "loch style", the same usually applies except when stripping big wets using a sinking line in rough conditions which is a bit boring.

Guest Speaker:

The President introduced our guest speaker Jules Stevens to the members. Jules's topic tonight will be on her recent and successful WWFC that was held in the Czech Republic in 2024.

The competition was held on 2 rivers (*Vltava River* Upper & Lower and *Malse River*) and 2 lakes (*Lipno* and *Kvetonov*). The water level in the rivers was high and the flow was fast which made the crossing sometimes treacherous. Nymph fishing (down and across) using 2 small #16 pink bead-headed nymphs was the most successful. The river beats were 200 m long, and a different licence was needed on each one. To fish the lakes there were 2 different methods. In *Kvetonov* it was only from a small boat and accompanied by another competitor. One at the bow the other at the stern and the boat was anchored to buoys. Fishing *Lipno* could be done either in a boat or from the shore. This time the boat will be drifting but still will have another competitor casting next to you.

The team of Karen Brooks (capt), Di Richards, Kerryn Milligan, Jane Forster, Jules Stevens and Peter Brooks (mgr) finished a creditable 3rd at the end. They were tied with France for 2nd with the number of placings but lost with less points.

The President led the members in showing their appreciation to Jules for a most entertaining presentation. He also wished her the best of luck in the upcoming

WWFC to be held in the USA in July.


