Spring Fishing

The next few months should provide members with their best opportunities for their preferred fishing style.

Rivers:

Those interested in chasing sea runners will be please to hear that the whitebait runs have started. The lower reaches of the waters that flow to the seas are the best places.

The recent rains has raised the river levels to inundate the surrounds and in some extent forming backwaters. Trout will forage over the newly flooded area for food and become good targets for the keen and patient angler.

Lakes:

The rains have been a godsend for our impoundments with Little Pine currently spilling as I write this. The only concerns that I have here are the high highs and extreme lows that occur at regular intervals. But when the waters are high fish can be found 'tailing' and 'frogging' over the newly flooded margins. Some tailing fish are

completely oblivious to you whilst others are easily spooked. Fast accurate casts with a low profile and a calm attitude can bring results. Frogs can be found in the marshy areas of lakes (mostly heard first) and attacked fiercely by the trout. A well placed imitation with the appropriate movement will incite a savage take.

Mayfly:

All waters will begin their dun hatches in Spring. Some at the end of September, some during October, some November and all will be in full swing by the second week of December.

Four Springs Lake has been the earliest water to see the first hatch of duns with Little Pine Lagoon in December being one of the last. This is possibly one of the most exciting types of fishing on our calendar. To find a fish, send a cast to its predicted position with the right fly, time the strike and win the battle is the best.

During this time the fish could be targeting the nymph, emerger or dun. Adding to this later on are the crippled duns, spinners and spent spinners. So a careful watch of the types of rises will dictate the type of flies to adopt. If unsure tie on a pair of two the different stages.

Soft-Hackled Flies

Background:

Continuing on from Peter Hazelwood's favourite flies are his sub-surface flies. Many times, we were floating aimlessly on the 'Pine with very little insect life and always full of expectations of a hatch. Pete would resort to changing from the dry flies to the wet flies, but not the normal streamers or nymphs. He would tie on some sparsely tied flies called soft-hackled flies which included 'partridge and yellow', 'partridge and orange', 'march brown spider', 'black and peacock spider', or 'snipe and purple'. His reason being that most of the food would be eaten below the surface and the flies covered the nymph stages of caddis, midge and mayfly.

Even though these flies were better suited to river fishing with a depth up to 1.2 metres he persisted and did have success. This was achieved by casting at 45 degrees to the boat's drift and letting the flies swing around before lifting to recast again. There are some flies that have been tied with a bead at the head to gain extra depth, but he did not use them. These flies have been around for many years. They have appeared in the very first English writings about fly fishing by Dame Juliana Berners in 1496 "The treatise of fishing with an


Angle". Her first of 12 listed flies - the 'Donne fly' is believed to be the 'partridge and orange' fly.

It is possible that the soft-hackled fly was first used in America by and Englishman in about 1832.

Generically speaking, the soft-hackled fly is one tied with the hackle of any birds such as partridge, grouse, woodcock, snipe, or starling. The hackles come from the backs, necks, breasts and from the leading edge of the wings of these birds.

The hackles are small and soft, but not floppy like marabou. The flies have no wings and only few patterns have tails. Fly sizes are generally small, ranging from #10 down to #16.

Some flies are tied with a thorax to accentuate the pulse action of the hackle.



Hook Light wire dry-fly hook sizes 10 - 16.

Thread UNI waxed thread - Orange.

Body Orange silk floss. Hackle Brown Partridge

Process:

- 1. Insert hook and lay down a bed of thread.
- 2. Tie the floss on top of the hook opposite the hook barb, wind thread forward to 1/8" short of the hook eye.
- 3. Wind the floss forward to where the thread stopped and tie in.
- 4. Select a hackle feather and strip off the fluff then pull the hackle barbs down to stand vertical.
- 5. Tie in the hackle stem with the natural curve of the feather facing the back.
- 6. Trim off the excess hackle stem.
- 7. Wind the hackle $1 \frac{1}{2}$ 2 times before locking in with the thread.
- 8. Trim off the excess hackle and thread.
- 9. Whip finish.

Note:

1. The hackle barbs will want to stick together, so will need to be separated during the winding.

Smoked Trout Dip



Ingredients:

½ lb smoked trout 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish

1 cup cream cheese ½ teaspoon smoked paprika

½ cup sour cream ½ teaspoon sweet paprika

½ cup mayonnaise ½ teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon onion powder

1 teaspoon lemon juice (more to taste)

Method:

- 1. Remove and discard the skin from the smoked trout.
- 2. Break apart the trout into rough pieces set aside.
- 3. Put the cream cheese, sour cream, and mayonnaise in a food processor and blend until smooth.
- 4. Add the salt, spices and lemon juice and blend again. Taste and adjust seasonings to suit.
- 5. Add the pieces of smoked trout and pulse the blender about 15 times, or until the trout is broken up and evenly distributed.
- 6. Taste test to adjust any of the spices or lemon juice.
- 7. Transfer the dip to an airtight container and chill in the refrigerator. The dip will thicken-up after a few hours.
- 8. Ready to serve after it has completely chilled and will keep up to a week in that container in the refrigerator.

It only takes 15 minutes to do the prep work and excellent with crackers, or even spread it on a toasted bagel.


